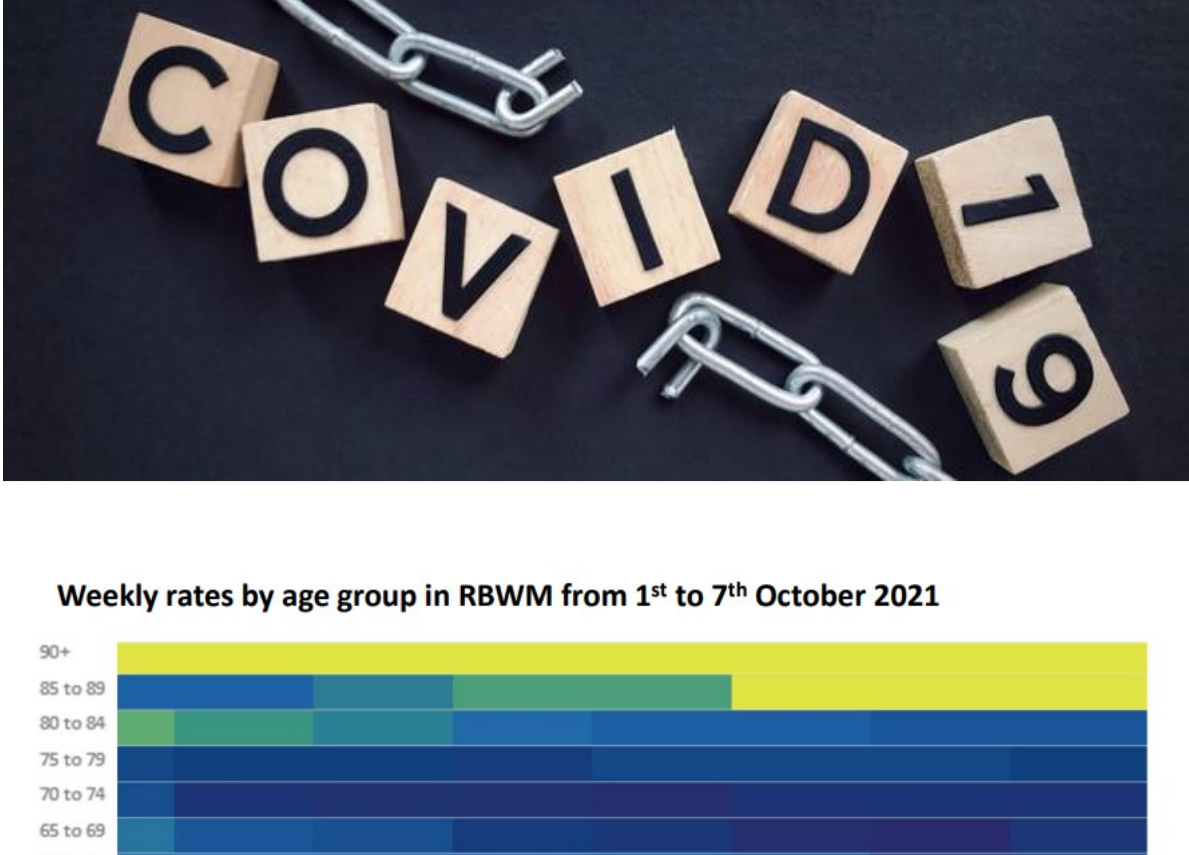
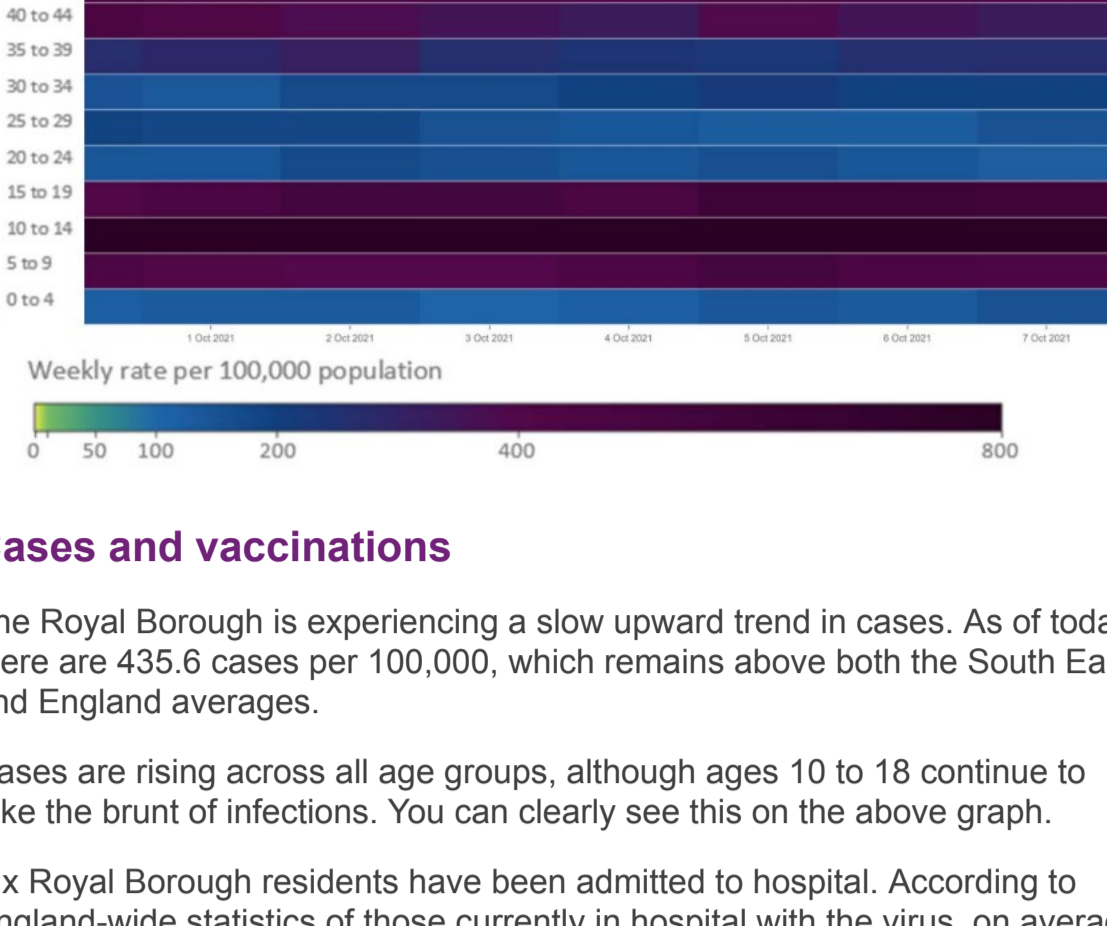

Cases and vaccinations

The Royal Borough is experiencing a slow upward trend in cases. As of today, there are 435.6 cases per 100,000, which remains above both the South East and England averages.

Cases are rising across all age groups, although ages 10 to 18 continue to take the brunt of infections. You can clearly see this on the above graph.

Six Royal Borough residents have been admitted to hospital. According to England-wide statistics of those currently in hospital with the virus, on average only 5% are fully vaccinated.

Our Contact Tracing Team continues to receive some 400 new cases per week – a level which started at the end of August. 65% of these cases are among school aged children.

Vaccination take-up has slowed in the Royal Borough in the past few weeks. 79% of Royal Borough residents have had both jabs, and among those aged 40+ it's 86%. Boosters have started and vaccinations for ages 12 to 15 continues. Parents, please remember to return your consent for your children no later than 48 hours before the Immunisation Team visits your school.

Covid grant for community groups

If you're a community group, voluntary or not-for-profit organisation in the Royal Borough, you could be eligible to get a grant to help tackle the prevalence of Covid in your area.

The council has a £50,000 funding pot to support hidden or hard to reach communities within the Royal Borough, to help boost uptake of the vaccination and regular testing.

Applications are open for this one-off grant funding and you apply online. The closing date is Sunday 21 November.

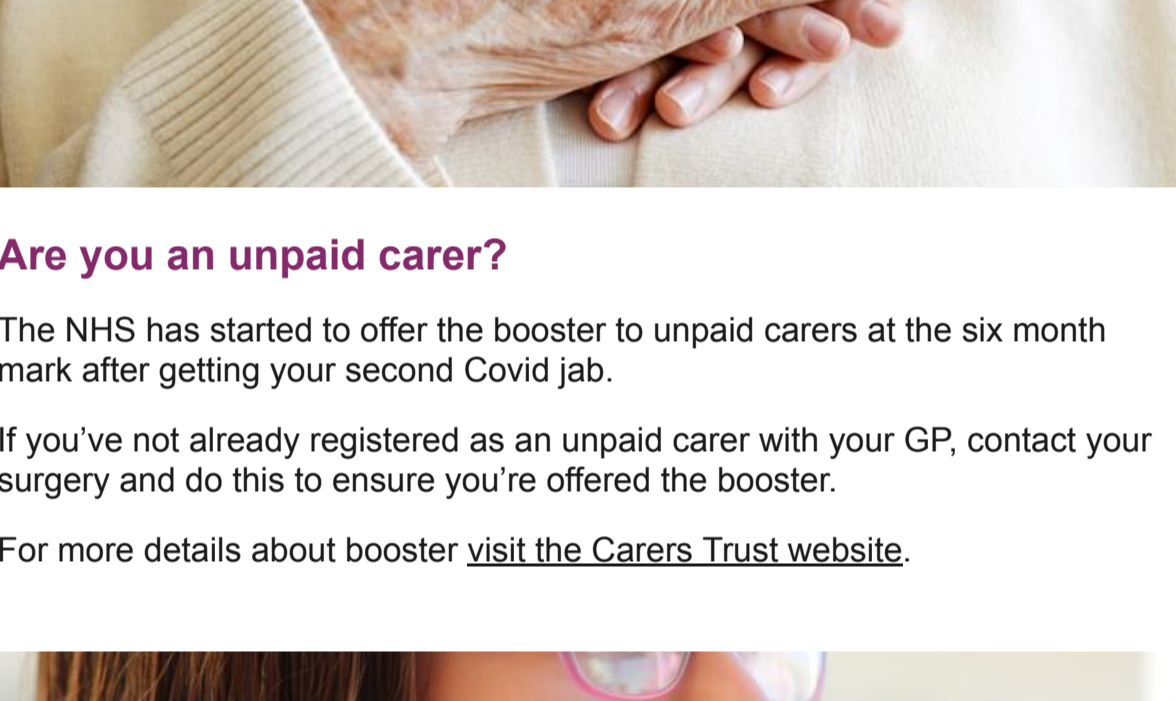


NHS Vaccine Bus

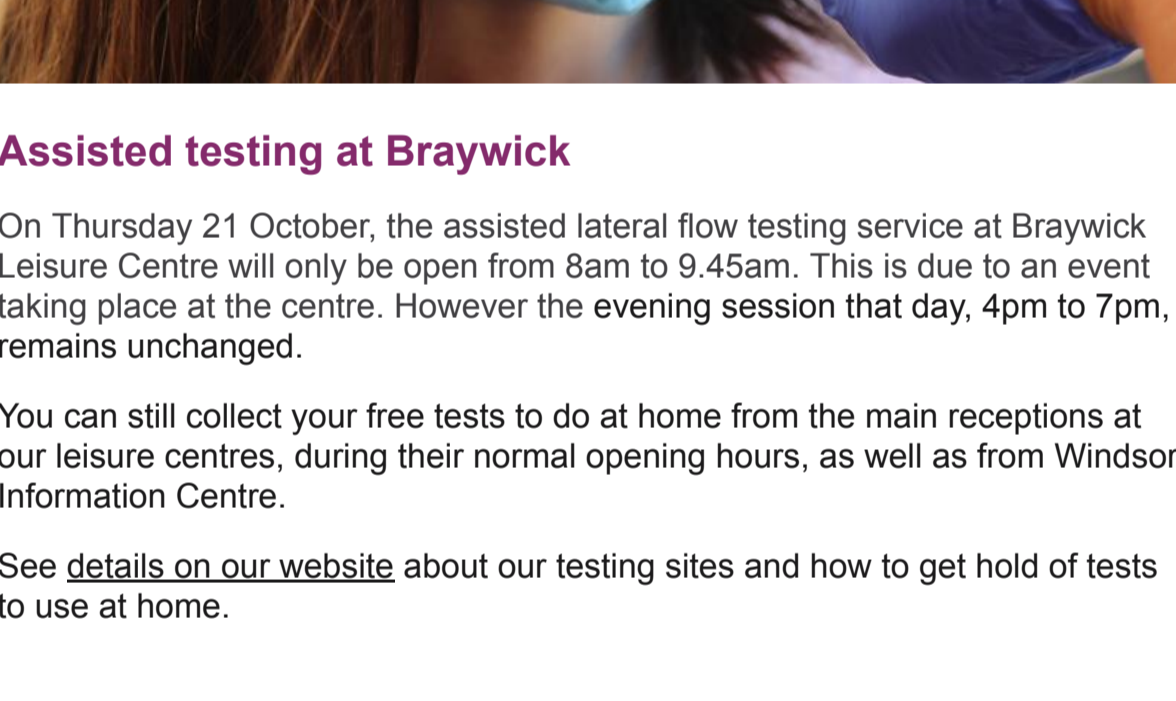


Are you an unpaid carer?

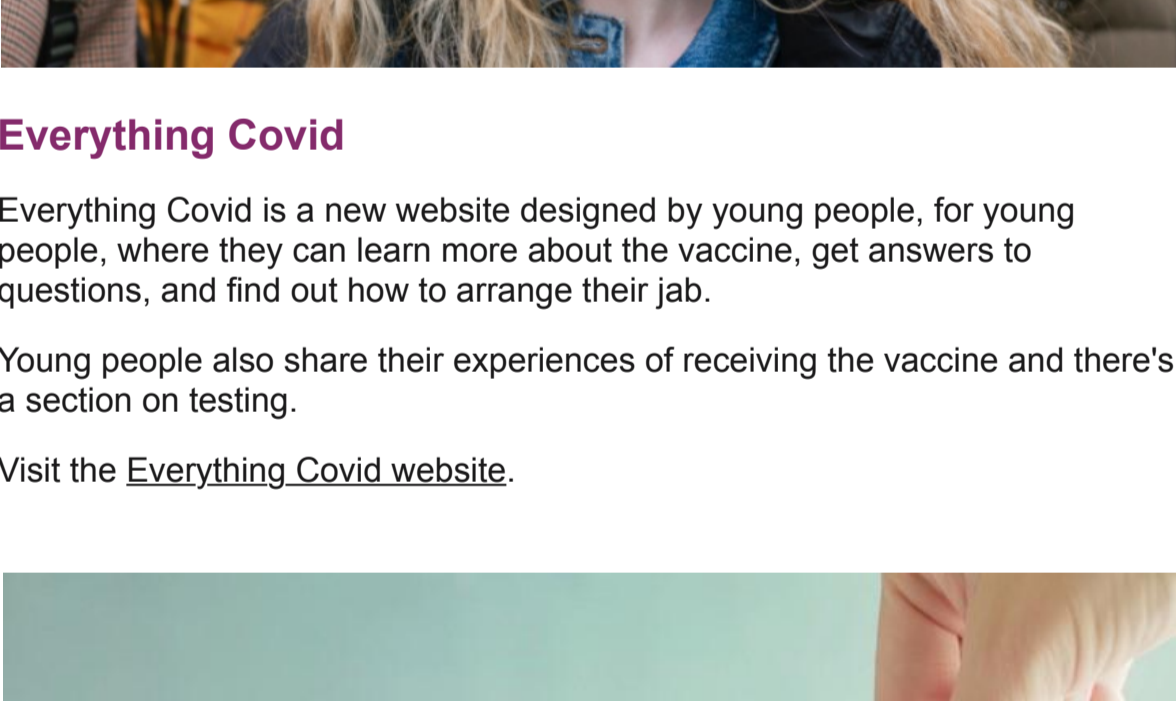


Assisted testing at Braywick

Banish the Covid blues

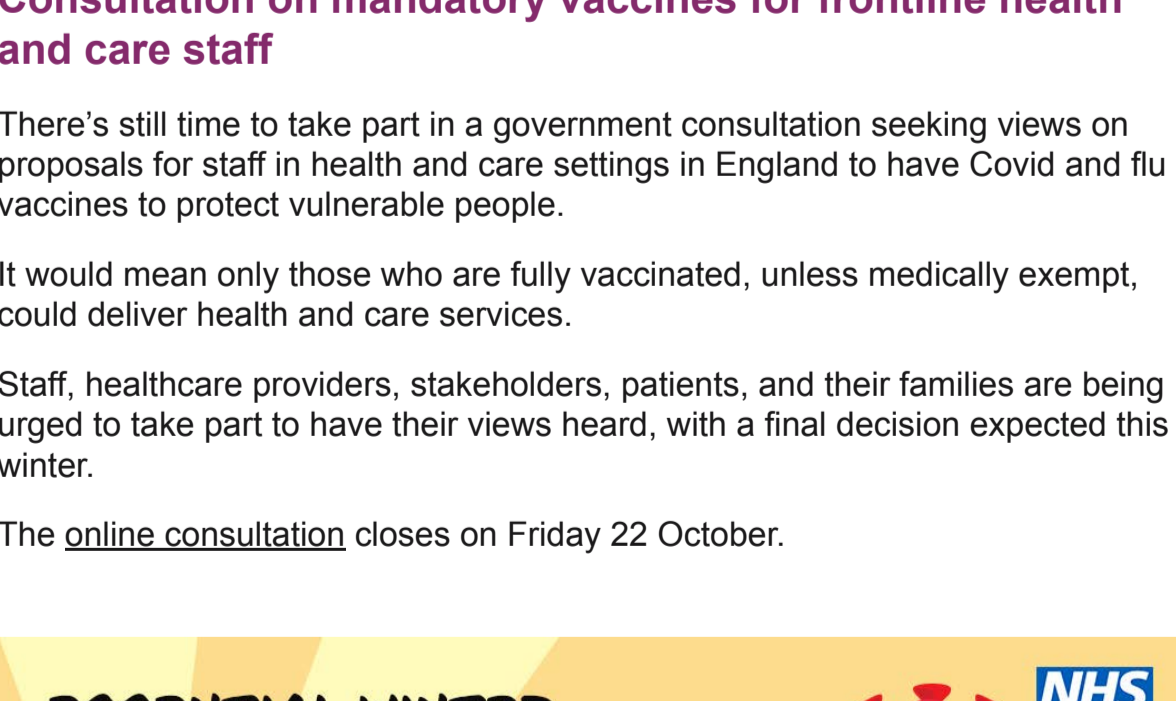
The impact and experiences of the past 18 months have been difficult for us all. No wonder our mental health and wellbeing have taken a battering.

In research commissioned by the Office for Health Improvement, 49% of adults in England say the pandemic has had a negative impact on their mental wellbeing, while 34% say they don't know what to do to improve it.

Younger adults say they're struggling the most in the research. 57% of 18 to 34-year-olds say their mental wellbeing has been affected, with 44% not knowing what to do to improve it.

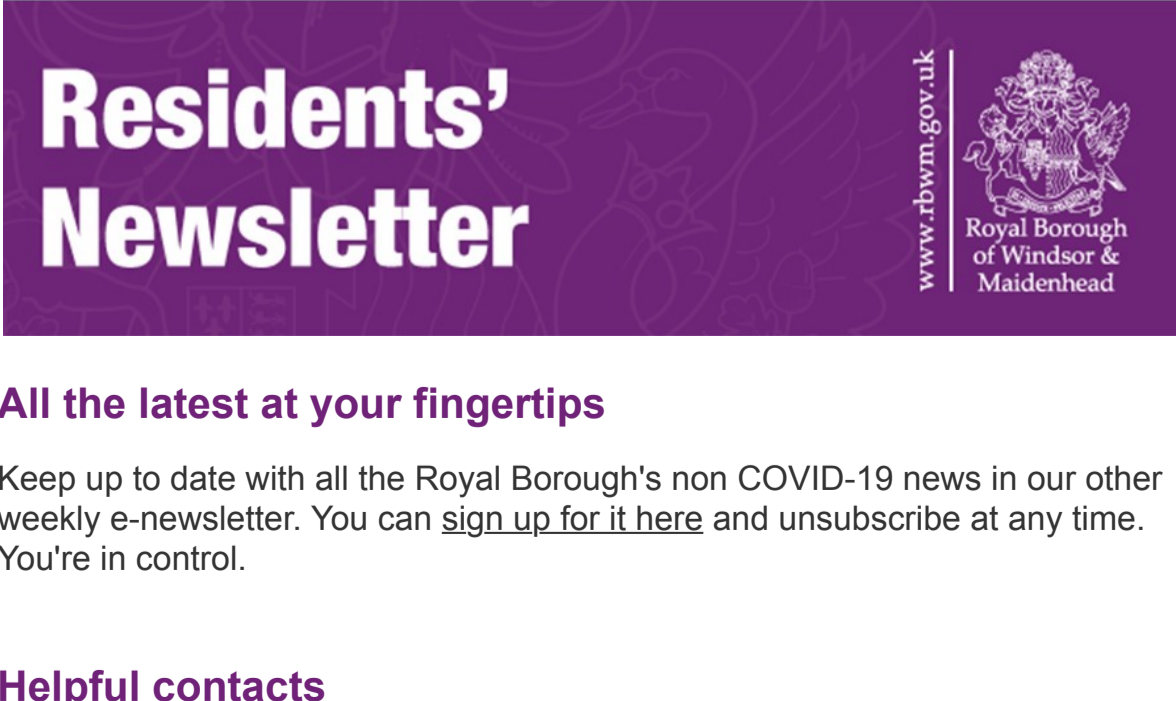
Consultation on mandatory vaccines for frontline health and care staff

There's still time to take part in a government consultation seeking views on proposals for staff in health and care settings in England to have Covid and flu vaccines to protect vulnerable people.

It would mean only those who are fully vaccinated, unless medically exempt, could deliver health and care services.

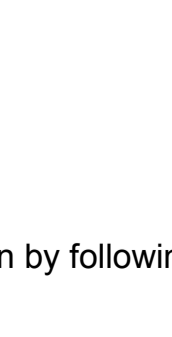
Staff, healthcare providers, stakeholders, patients, and their families are being urged to take part to have their views heard, with a final decision expected this winter.
