There was a brief report on the activities of the association;

Robin Howard also advised the group that the Maidenhead Golf Club are still strongly considering a move to Fifield Village. This would cause severe disruption to residents with up to 800 traffic movements per day. There are also concerns over the quality of the land which is a previous landfill site.

There was a brief review of the Fifield Fun Day and cheques were presented to the charities. Louise Shenston and Julie Glover announced that they would both stand down as organisers of the Fifield Fun Day.

Andy McCabe from the Starfish Swimming Club gave a brief talk on the aspirations and activities of the charity.

There was also a very entertaining talk from Jeffrey Pick, from the Police Service, on Community safety.

The meeting closed at 9pm but many people stayed on for another drink and a chat.
